





THE CFC NETWORK IN THE UK



Nottingham's **CFC Journey**





The council, community and children and young people come together to agree their priorities, known as 'badges'



DEVELOPMENT

March 2023 -October 2023

An action plan is drafted and approved showing how the council will achieve progress in those badges



DELIVERY

2-4 years November 2023 -November 2025 (minimum)

The council works with the local community and children and young people to carry out the action plan



RECOGNITION

Lasts for 3 years November 2025 **→** 2028

An independent panel of experts assesses the council's progress and decides whether to recognise the city/community as a **UNICEF UK Child Friendly** City or Community

A CHILD RIGHTS-BASED APPROACH

What does this mean?

- A practical framework for working with and for children.
- Rights provide the lens through which actions affecting children are rooted, reviewed and resolved.
- It requires knowledge and awareness of children's rights throughout the local authority and partners.
- It places the relationship between children as rights holders and governments and services as duty bearers at the forefront.







A CHILD RIGHTS-BASED APPROACH

Putting this into practice

- Reflecting on your own organisation, how you work, and how you meet the needs of children and young people.
- Embedding best practice Child Rights Impact Assessments (CRIA).
- Supporting CFN delivery organisations resourcing activity, building links with communities, providing specialist support such as Communications, Evaluation or Data. Badge areas.
- Co-developing a culture in Nottingham that places Children and Young People at the centre.



Child Friendly Nottingham's Badge (Priority) Choices






















Nottingham, a city for children and young people...


What do we know about children and young people's lives? Who wants to know? And what for?

- An ethical framework, consistently delivered, with positive impact






Due to the large numbers of students at the two Universities, Nottingham continues to have a different age structure to the national average, with 30.8% of the population being between 15 and 29, and nearly half (48%) aged under 30. This compares to 18.3% and 35.7% respectively for England.

The median age in Nottingham is 31, the second youngest of all Local Authorities, along with Oxford, Cambridge and Manchester. (The youngest is Tower Hamlets, with a median age of 30.)






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
