Nottingham families get creative for free this summer: Pop in to the Summer Arts Pop-Up!



Keeping children busy over the school summer holidays just got easier! This year families can pop into a new dedicated space for art and creativity in the Victoria Centre — the Summer Arts Pop-up - which will be opened to the public on Wednesday, 6 August and then every Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 11am - 3pm until Saturday 30 August.

Hosted by our partners ChalleNGe and the Young Creative Awards the Pop-up Shop is situated in the Upper Mall of Victoria Centre, next to The Entertainer toy Shop, there will be a host of drop-in creative activities for all the family to enjoy together, all led by a Minister for Joy and suitable for early years to teenagers, including:

- Regular features include a Lego corner and cardboard construction workshop, games and self-led crafting activities
- A changing programme of creative workshops, led by artists and local cultural organisations
- An interactive dance experience using VR Headsets
- © Children and young people's exhibitions: Young Creative Awards 2025 shortlist exhibition, RED from Lakeside Arts (Rufford and Crabtree Farm Schools) and HOME; an installation by the Nottingham Schools Trust.
- Chill out space for reading and quieter activities
- A space for teenagers to create and connect
- Opportunities to listen to children and young people's experiences of the city with Child Friendly Nottingham.















In addition, there is a series of Creative Futures workshops on Wednesdays between 4-6pm led by Young Creative Awards Alumni and Connecting Notts youth network to explore how young people can turn their creative talent into a career sessions from 4-6pm in the Pop Up space, aimed at those wanting to find out more about working in the arts and building a creative life and career.

The Summer Arts Pop Up is a collaboration between Young Creatives Nottingham, ChalleNGe (Local Cultural Education Partnership), Arts Partners and is supported by Victoria Centre, Nottingham. It is part of the Child Friendly Creative City initiative, launched in June 2025.

As well as engaging with fun activities, the Summer Arts Pop Up will be a onestop shop for families to discover what is happening across the arts and cultural sector over the summer break. You can also share your own favourite places for creativity and inspiration in your community.

Articles 31 Resource

This month, we will be highlighting Article 31 from the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), to raise awareness for raise awareness for National Play Day on the 6th August 2025





Article 31: Right to Play

Every child has the right to relax, play and take part in a wide range of cultural activities.

Article 31: Right to Play

Article 31 of the UNCRC says that children and young people have the right to rest and have fun in whichever way they prefer. This can be through sport, watching films, theatre, music or something else.

Just like adults, children and young people should have the freedom to take part in various cultural acitvities and the government should make this easy for them to do without discriminating if they have a diability, low income or other barriers. This could include either online or in person opportunities.

Why is playtime and rest important?

Play is a natural part of childhood and an integral part of a child's and young person's development. It is a key factor in helping develop physical motor skills and emotional cognitive wellbeing through growth, learning and development. It helps creativity and cultural awareness, allowing children and young people to explore the world around them as well as learn to take responsibility for their own choices.

Next month, we will be **highlighting Article 38 and 39**, to raise awareness for International Day of Peace on the 21st September 2025.

- Article 38: War and armed conflicts
 - PROTECTION IN WAR Governments must not allow children under the age of 15 to take part in war or join the armed forces. Governments must do everything they can to protect and care for children affected by war and armed conflict.
- Article 39: Recovery from trauma and reintegration Children who have experienced neglect, abuse, exploitation, torture or who are victims of war must receive special support to help them recover their health, dignity, self-respect and social life.


It was a positive event with more than 120 stakeholders present
